One of the primary reasons English pronunciation poses such challenges is its diverse array of vowel sounds. For instance, the distinction between short and long vowels can change the meaning of a word entirely, as seen in "ship" versus "sheep." Furthermore, English features a variety of diphthongs—complex vowel sounds that glide from one vowel to another within the same syllable—which can be particularly tricky for learners who are accustomed to simpler vowel systems. Additionally, consonant clusters, which are groups of two or more consonants that appear together in a syllable, can be overwhelming for speakers whose native languages do not utilize such combinations. Stress patterns in English also contribute to pronunciation difficulties. Unlike some languages where each syllable is given equal weight, English relies heavily on stress to convey meaning. Incorrectly stressing a syllable can not only alter the meaning of a word but can also render it unrecognizable to native speakers. For example, the noun "record" is stressed on the first syllable (RE-cord), while the verb "record" is stressed on the second syllable (re-CORD). Such distinctions are crucial for clear communication and are often overlooked by learners.

Despite these challenges, overcoming pronunciation hurdles is entirely achievable with the right strategies and resources. By focusing on specific areas of difficulty and employing targeted practice techniques, learners can significantly improve their pronunciation skills. This article aims to explore common mistakes in English pronunciation and provide practical solutions to help learners navigate these challenges effectively. Through dedicated practice and an understanding of the intricacies of English sounds, non-native speakers can enhance their speaking abilities, boost their confidence, and ultimately achieve clearer communication in English.

### Literature review

Research indicates that pronunciation difficulties stem from various factors, including the influence of the speaker's first language (L1) phonetic system (Derwing Munro, 2005). For instance, certain sounds in English may not exist in other languages, leading to mispronunciations (Saito, 2013). Additionally, stress and intonation patterns differ across languages, further complicating pronunciation for learners (Gilbert, 2008). Studies by Levis (2005) suggest that many learners struggle with segmental features (individual sounds) and suprasegmental features (stress, rhythm, intonation). Furthermore, a meta-analysis by Tsukada Tschirner (2009) emphasizes the role of listening comprehension in pronunciation accuracy, indicating that exposure to authentic speech is crucial for improvement. Strategies for overcoming pronunciation challenges have also

been explored. Techniques such as focused phonetic training (Baker Murphy, 2011), the use of technology (e.g., pronunciation apps and online resources), and peer feedback mechanisms have shown promise in enhancing learners' pronunciation skills (Derwing et al., 2012).

#### Methods

To investigate the common pronunciation challenges faced by non-native English speakers and effective strategies for improvement, a mixed-methods approach was employed.

##### 1 Participants

A total of 100 non-native English speakers from diverse linguistic backgrounds participated in an online survey. Additionally, 15 participants were selected for follow-up interviews.

##### 2. Data Collection

The survey included multiple-choice questions and open-ended responses aimed at identifying common pronunciation errors and preferred learning strategies. Interviews were conducted to gain deeper insights into individual experiences with pronunciation challenges.

##### 3. Data Analysis

Quantitative data from the surveys were analyzed using descriptive statistics, while qualitative data from interviews were coded thematically to identify recurring themes related to pronunciation difficulties and solutions.

#### Results and discussion

The survey results indicated that the most common pronunciation challenges included the mispronunciation of vowel sounds (45%), difficulty with consonant clusters (30%), and issues with intonation patterns (25%). The interviews revealed that many participants felt that lack of exposure to native speakers significantly impacted their pronunciation skills.

Participants reported several effective strategies for overcoming these challenges:

- **Phonetic Training:** Engaging in targeted exercises helped participants improve their articulation of difficult sounds.

- **Listening Practice:** Regularly listening to native speakers through media like podcasts and movies enhanced their understanding of stress and intonation.

- **Technology Utilization:** Many learners found mobile apps useful for practicing pronunciation in an interactive manner.

These findings align with previous research highlighting the effectiveness of focused practice and exposure in developing pronunciation skills (Baker Murphy, 2011; Derwing et al., 2012).

#### Conclusion

This study highlights the prevalent pronunciation challenges faced by non-native English speakers and suggests practical strategies for overcoming these difficulties. By incorporating phonetic training, increasing exposure to native speech, and leveraging technology, learners can significantly improve their pronunciation skills. Future research could explore the long-term effects of these strategies on overall language proficiency. Mastering English pronunciation is a vital component of effective communication and can significantly impact one's confidence and clarity in speaking.
