Group work activities: In Penny Ur's book "Discussions that Work," she provides a comprehensive list of group activities that language teachers can integrate into their classes. Some of these activities include discussions, debates, problem-solving situations, simulations/role plays, news forecasting, creating stories, fashion shows, talk shows, dramatizations, surveys or interviews, information gap activities/jigsaws, board games, concentration games, writing classified ads, obituaries, letters to the editor, and various projects such as collages, advertisements, and fundraising campaigns.

These activities promote collaboration, communication, critical thinking, and creativity among students in an engaging and interactive manner. Advantages of team work: The utilization of group work in EFL teaching should not be seen as a mere time-filling activity or a mindless task assigned by teachers to manage administrative duties. It should not be a convenient excuse for teachers to engage in personal tasks such as reading, resting, or preparing for other classes, nor should it be implemented simply to mimic the practices of others without a true understanding of its purpose. The true intention behind incorporating group work in an EFL classroom extends beyond the superficial directive of "Form groups and answer these questions," which often results in individual rather than collaborative work.

8 pros of group work:

- Collaboration improves the ability to solve problems effectively.
- Working together fosters creativity and new ideas.
- Teamwork leads to increased employee satisfaction.
- Cooperation promotes individual development.
- Working as a team reduces the likelihood of burnout.
- Teamwork provides avenues for personal and professional growth.
- Collaborative efforts result in higher productivity levels.
- Teamwork encourages more strategic and calculated risk-taking.

Disadvantages of team work

One of the drawbacks of group work in teaching is the issue of noise. When students collaborate, they often speak simultaneously, creating a noisy environment that can disrupt others. However, according to Doff (1991), the noise generated during group work is typically considered "positive" as it indicates students are actively using English and participating in a learning activity (p. 141). To address the noise problem, teachers can remind students that they do not need to shout to communicate effectively, which can help maintain a more manageable noise level.

8 cons of group work:

- May lead to being more cautious when taking risks.
- Potential to become stuck in a routine.
